**1: Antonia de Cordoba** - New Name & New Device


*Or, on a bend argent fimbriated between two sheep passant sable three roses proper.*

Submitter desires a feminine name.

No major changes.

Language (Spanish) most important.

Culture (Spanish) most important.



**2: Collette Storme** - New Name & New Device

*Argent, a bat-winged dragon's head cabossed per pale sable and vert, a bordure per pale vert and sable.*

Submitter desires a feminine name.

Sound most important.



**3: Cora da Monte** - New Device

OSCAR finds the name on the An Tir LoI of July 31, 2012 as submitted.


*Sable, on a pile argent a spider sable.*



**4: Elizabet Walker of Paislay - New Device**

OSCAR finds the name on the Calontir LoI of August 24, 2012 as submitted.


*Purple, a horse's head coupé Or within a horseshoe inverted, on a chief argent three roses purple barbed and seeded proper.*



**5: Gobbán Mac Roibeááird - New Device**

OSCAR is unable to find the name, either registered or submitted.

*Vert, a chevron cotised between two blacksmith tongs fesswise respectant and a brazier argent.*




**6: Jacqueline Storme - New Name & New Device**

*Azure, a Celtic cross Or winged, in chief three estoiles in fess argent, a bordure argent semy of lilies azure.*  
Sound most important.



**7: Lasair Táilliúir - New Badge**

OSCAR finds the name registered exactly as it appears in February of 2002, via Calontir


*Gules, on a flame argent a sheep passant sable and on a chief argent a Lochaber axe sable*



**8: Letoslava Dragonova - New Device**

OSCAR finds the name on the Calontir LoI of September 30, 2012 as submitted.  
*Gules, a three-headed dragon argent within an orle argent ermined gules.*

This was returned at Kingdom in September 2012. Her previous submission, "Gules, a three-headed, four-legged hydra argent within an orle ermime", conflicted with "Gules, a dragon segreant, breathing flames, a chief rayonny ermine." There was one point of difference in changing the chief to an orle, but there was no heraldic difference between a dragon and a hydra. We believe the change made on this resubmission fixes this issue.




Blazon was changed from "three-headed, four-legged hydra" to "three-headed dragon" at the Kingdom level after commentary so that the blazon was much simplified.

**9: Luc Fitz Warrin** - New Name & New Device

*Or, an escutcheon between three annulets, a chief embattled sable.*

Submitter desires a masculine name.

No major changes.



**10: Melisent McAfee** - New Device

OSCAR finds the name registered exactly as it appears in March of 2005, via Calontir


*Per chevron Or and vert, two fleurs-de-lis purpure and three thistles one and two Or.*



**11: Meryk ap Cadell** - New Badge

OSCAR finds the name on the Calontir LoI of April 03, 2012 as submitted.

*(Fieldless) An increscent and a decrescent conjoined in fess per pale sable and Or surmounted by a wolf's head cabossed maintaining in its mouth a quarrel counterchanged.*




The previous submission, (Fieldless) On a rondel per pale sable and Or, a wolf's paw counterchanged," was returned at the Kingdom level in May 2012 because of the attempt to register a rondel (shield shape) which cannot be used as the single primary charge of a fieldless badge.

**12: Raven Wyld** - New Name & New Device

*Argent, a fess embattled counter-embattled azure between a raven displayed and a sea-wolf embowed contourny sable, within a bordure embattled azure.*

Submitter desires a masculine name.

Sound most important.


Originally submitted as Raven zum Wyld, this was changed at Kingdom level to match the documentation.

**13: Røþprekr Herkja** - New Name & New Device

*Per fess argent and azure, three owls counterchanged.*

Submitter desires a masculine name.

Client requests authenticity for 12th-13th century Danish.



**14: Vladek Sasul** - New Device

OSCAR finds the name on the Calontir LoI of April 03, 2012 as submitted.

*Per bend purpure and sable, a serpent involved within an orle argent.*



His previous submission, "Per bend purpure and sable, a serpent involved in annulo argent" was returned by Kingdom in May 2012 because of a conflict with

"Sable, an open penannular brooch, pin to base, argent" since there is no distinction among serpents in annulo, annulets, and pennanular brooches.
